Worship Theme for November--

What does it Mean to be a People of Abundance?

When it comes to abundance, our culture and our religion are clearly at odds. Our culture cries, "Accumulate!" Our religion counsels "Appreciate!" The mantras couldn't be more different: The commercials tell us to "Go out and get what you want!" The pulpits plea with us to "learn to want what you have."



So, yes, appreciation is central to this month. Noticing the abundance around us is clearly the work we are called to do. But one wonders if that's enough. It all depends on what you do after the noticing is done.

Sometimes there's a passivity to appreciation that leaves nothing changed. There's a big difference between appreciating the blessing of family and committing to sitting down together for dinner at least three or four times a week. It's one thing to notice the beauty that fills your own backyard; it's quite another to pull yourself out of the rat race so you have time to enjoy it. It helps to have a sermon remind us that our spouse or parent is doing the best they can, but that insight rarely sticks without a commitment to action that helps us truly let go of all the things we wish they were and embrace the limited but wonderful abundance of what they are.

In short, appreciation only gets us part of the way there. Noticing places abundance in view, but only new commitments put it within reach. Without a decision to change our lives, noticing becomes nothing more than nostalgia.

So, what needs to change? Maybe that's the real question this month. What needs altered so you can dance with what is plentiful rather than worrying about what is scarce? What clutter finally needs cleaned up so there is room for new abundance to enter in? What changes will free you from the urgent and allow in the important?

Yes, people of abundance make time for noticing, but they also make tough choices. Choices that, after they are made, don't really feel tough at all.

Spiritual abundance is waiting for us friends. May this be the month we choose it.

LETTER FROM OUR MINISTER

October 31, 2017

Dear Members of the Unitarian Universalist
Congregation of Lawrence,

Yesterday I informed the board of my decision to resign as your minister effective June 30, 2018, about eight months from now.



This has not been an easy decision. As some of you know, during the past several years I've been contemplating when exactly to leave parish ministry. It still feels way too early to leave this calling that I love so deeply. Yet every minister knows that a time must come to move on for the health of the congregation, at the inevitable moment when further progress together finally seems unlikely.

During the past several years, UUCL has struggled with what I can only describe as an identity crisis. Despite a series of well-attended dialogue circles where members shared their experiences and hopes for the future, two years of intensive work on a new mission and vision, a six-month process with a congregational consultant, a weekend leadership retreat with presentations by two Unitarian Universalist ministers, and the congregation's adoption of a three-year strategic plan, UUCL remains a deeply divided congregation. We seem to be stuck in a place of unproductive anxiety. There is still profound if often unacknowledged ambivalence about the 2010 decision, after fifty years of lay leadership, to call a minister. UUCL does not for the most part understand the minister-congregation relationship, which is perhaps unsurprising given that UUCL never went through the usual process of deciding to call a minister.

One member who was instrumental in helping UUCL to call a minister, was quoted in the consultant's report as saying that the move toward ministry was intended "to increase our diversity, to widen our circle and to provide for people that wanted a spiritual aspect a time where they could come and worship or do spiritual activities other than the program." In retrospect, it's clear to me that many members did in fact believe that to be the purpose of calling a minister. The result was that professional ministry was simply added to the already existing fellowship way of being -- a way that had evolved as it did precisely because there was not a minister.

The deep ambivalence has led to an equally deep inertia and, I believe, an inability to see and name the spiritual, emotional, and relational harm caused by failing to confront and courageously move past this divided culture. The actual and opportunity costs to volunteers, leaders, staff, and potential new members of maintaining this status quo are high and ongoing.

My own role in our failure to confront this division is significant, and for that I ask your forgiveness. I often wonder what might have happened if, in 2010 when you decided to call me as your first minister, I had made my acceptance contingent on the congregation going through the usual "start-up" process with an outside denominational facilitator. Would there have been the requisite 90% vote to call if you had all understood the role of both minister and congregation in this new relationship, and the changes that would require? It's a critically important question that remains to be answered.

After nearly two years of thoughtful observation and deliberation with many mentors, colleagues, and denominational consultants, I've come to understand the impossibility of the congregation's finally making the necessary yet hard decisions about its future, as long as I remain in the role of minister. It isn't possible for a minister to effectively serve a congregation that is not united in its diversity as one people. My continuing presence undermines the urgency of your confronting that difficult truth.

When a minister leaves, the normal procedure is to announce the departure in March, to allow approximately six weeks for the board to work with the UUA Transitions Office to hire an interim minister for one to two years. The interim minister is charged with helping the congregation come to terms with its history, discover a new identity, and commit to new directions in ministry in preparation for calling its next settled minister. But in consultation with MidAmerica regional staff, I've made the decision to instead announce my leaving eight months in advance. This will allow you an extended period to discern together, this time with new understanding, your hopes and intentions regarding

professional ministry at UUCL. It's also important that in the search for a new Director of Faith Development in the wake of Bonnie Blosser's departure in December, we are able to let candidates know what to expect concerning UUCL's future related to the presence of a minister.

Regardless of the circumstances or the timing, my leaving UUCL was always going to be a hard and sad decision. I've been in love with this congregation since I first arrived to serve you twelve years ago, and am so grateful for my time with you. Together we've made some major accomplishments that we'll be naming and celebrating in the months to come. I've had the good fortune to work with so many incredible lay leaders, volunteers, and staff members whose kindness, humor, wisdom and creativity have brought joy to my life and to the life of UUCL. We'll have many months to say goodbye, and I hope we'll make time for lots of one-on-one conversations together. I plan to set aside time to be available to any and all of you who'd like to meet with me informally over the coming months, to share memories, express concerns, or begin to process feelings.

I'll be proud to represent UUCL at UUA General Assembly in Kansas City next June -- my last official act as your minister. After that I plan to take several months attending to my own discernment and professional development, with the possibility of doing ministry with Unitarian Universalists in Europe, short-term consulting with American churches, and other interesting options that present themselves to connect with UUs and interfaith partners creating the world of peace, love, and justice that we all seek.

I invite you to join me this Sunday, November 5, when I'll speak more about my resignation and my hopes for the future of UUCL. In closing -- for now -- I offer you this poem with my hopes and confidence, dear UUCL, that you will one day go where you find your beloved -- go where you find yourself.

MONTHLY COMMUNITY CONNECTIONS: FAITH IN ACTION

Each week, our Sunday collection is given to a community organization that reflects our values and is chosen by our Social Justice Team.

The **September** Community Connection was **Kansas Equality Coalition** and the Congregation gave away a total of \$824.80. This will shortly be delivered by one of the Social Justice team members.

The **November Community Connection** is UUSC, the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee. The UUSC works with 50 grassroots partners in 20 countries and in the U.S. to build a world free from oppression. From our work with women and children held in U.S. detention centers, to providing Syrian refugees humanitarian aid and legal assistance, to mobilizing against climate change, we are working to ensure that human rights are a reality for everyone.

Social Justice Team Monthly Report for October and Upcoming November Events

The Social Justice team and UUCL congregation recognizes the month of October as LGBTQ month!

The Community Connection recipient for October is Parents as Teachers. Parents as Teachers is a FUN and FREE early childhood education program available to anyone who is pregnant or has a child under the age of 3 and lives within the USD 497 school district.

On October 1, several UUCL's went to the Let the People Vote Campaign held at the Lied Center. The program drew a full house of interested participants, and was broadcast in several cities.

Tonganoxie, KS organized quickly to defeat a plan by Tyson Foods, to build a chicken processing plant. A Facebook page appeared and an event on October 3 drew 2-3000 people to Tonganoxie (with at least one UUCL member) to voice their disapproval of the venture, and later Dr. Don Stull gave a presentation on the effect of large poultry plants on communities.

October 28 at the First Presbyterian Church, Justice Matters presented A Night of Hope at 6-30pm.

IndivisibleKC continues sending notice of weekly gatherings at legislators' offices including Sen. Jerry Moran and Pat Roberts, and Rep. Kevin Yoder. IndivisibleKC reminds us to make calls to legislators or write to them as well.

November 4, ACLU invites us to a We the People Tour, Douglas County, at the Lawrence Public Library, Meeting Room C, at 2:00pm, to hear what we're doing to protect civil liberties in our state, meet other ACLU supporters in your area, and learn how you can make a difference in your own community.

LAWRENCE INTERFAITH REFUGEE & IMMIGRANT MINISTRY (LIRIM) is hosting an "Immigrant Advocacy Sunday" on November 5, 4:00-6:00pm, in the Lawrence Public Library auditorium. You're invited to stop in to write letters, make phone calls, and use social media to advocate with for more humane policies in support of refugees and immigrants. Awake, a Dream from Standing Rock is a film which captures the story of Native-led peaceful protest that forever changed the fight for clean water, our environment, and the

future of our planet. This film is a collaboration between Indigenous filmmakers, Director Myron Dewey, Executive Producer Doug Good Feather and environmental Oscar Nominated filmmakers Josh Fox and James Spione. The film will be shown on Thursday, Nov. 9 at 7pm at Liberty Hall, and on **Friday, Nov. 10, 7pm** at Haskell Indian Nations University Auditorium.
